Enveloping students to help them persist, complete

PDO Funds Student Supports for Program Year 5

WHILE RIGOROUS ACADEMIC STUDIES ARE CENTRAL TO PDO STUDENTS' EDUCATION, the supports that provide them with technology, textbooks, counseling, mentoring, English as a Second Language, and other types of assistance help them to persist and complete their educational journeys successfully.

The PDO recognizes the value of these supports and has provided funding for them for Program Year 5, which began July 1. Students should check with their educational institution for the availability of supports, which may be apportioned by needs and available funds across the program year; it is possible (but not guaranteed) that additional funds may become available for more supports. All PDO students are also encouraged to take advantage of the many college/university supports that are often routinely offered, such as general tutoring, health services, advising, and success coaching. These vary by institution and program, and are integral to student success!

REGISTER NOW FOR FALL CLASSES!

Many colleges and universities begin the fall term in August. NOW is the time to talk to your PD Coordinator or academic advisor to register for classes. Don't delay, so you are sure to get the courses you need!





Mentoring and success coaching are among the many supports the PDO funds and which many educational partners provide routinely to all enrolled students.

"The ECEPDO@PASSHE aims to envelope our students with a menu of supports that address their needs and enable them to overcome barriers and persist in their educational pathways," says PDO Director Liz Knouse. "Many of our students balance employment and academic demands, along with home responsibilities. Supports are structured to address a wide variety of needs that both students and educational partners have indicated are central to student success. If additional funding should become available, the measure of supports may be able to increase commensurately," she adds. The PDO also funds Pediatric CPR/First Aid training, which is required for ECE professionals.

PENNSYLVANIA TO EXPAND AFFORDABLE HIGH-SPEED BROADBAND ACCESS

ECEPDO@PASSHE STUDENTS CAN DIRECTLY BENEFIT

from the recently announced expansion of affordable, high-speed internet access to unserved and underserved parts of the commonwealth, thanks to \$1.16 billion in new federal funding! Announced earlier this month by Governor Josh Shapiro, the funding is coming to Pennsylvania through the federal Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program and as part of an "Internet for All" initiative.

"By expanding access to affordable, high-speed internet to every Pennsylvanian, we can create real opportunities for our students, our businesses, and our communities to learn, grow, and thrive," Governor Shapiro said, adding, "this will ensure they can go to school, start and grow businesses, and access telemedicine no matter where they live."

The Pennsylvania Broadband Development Authority, an independent, bipartisan agency created by law in December 2021, will administer the funds and encourages Pennsylvanians to participate in community engagement events that are being held around the state this summer. Feedback will be collected from scheduled <u>in-person</u> events, as well as an <u>online survey</u>, and used to help shape broadband programs, including the five-year BEAD action plan.

REAL PLAY MAKES A REAL DIFFERENCE

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATORS KNOW PLAY IS KEY TO A CHILD'S HEALTHY BRAIN DEVELOPMENT. It helps them to learn new skills, how to share with others, make decisions, and express their feelings as they work through new and challenging experiences.

What are some types of play you can encourage?

- Large and small-motor play
- Language play (telling stories, making up silly songs)
- Construction play (building forts)
- Sensory play (playing in mud, water)
- Make-believe play (let's pretend)
- Rough-and-tumble and risk-taking play
- Symbolic play (turning a stick into a magic wand)
- Mastery play (learning to do new things)

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that children should have plenty of unscheduled, independent, non-screen time, away from television, tablets, and videos, and that play should be child-driven, rather than adultdirected. "Active, child-centered play is a time-tested way of producing healthy, fit young bodies."

According to Pennsylvania's Promise for Children, those who have plenty of time for free, open-ended play score higher in reading and math tests. Studies also reportedly

> show that lack of real play results in more childhood obesity, higher levels of frustration and aggression in young children, and less creativity and imagination.
